These states blend populist rhetoric with digital authoritarianism, leveraging national identity and economic anxiety to shape collective narratives. Lanier advocates for “humanistic capitalism,” proposing decentralized architectures that return control and economic share to individuals. Conversely, others like Kevin Kelly envision a future of “abundance networks,” where open-source collaboration and AI augmentation enable collective intelligence to solve global challenges—provided governance keeps pace. Neuroscientists studying group dynamics reveal that synchronized brain activity occurs during large-scale social coordination, suggesting a biological basis for collective behavior. Yet this synchronization can be exploited—via emotional toning in speeches, viral memes, or algorithmic curation—to nudge populations toward consensus without rational debate. The danger lies in the erosion of deliberative space, where reasoned discourse is replaced by emotional resonance.

Controversies and Risks: The Erosion of Shared Reality

The weaponization of the will of many raises profound ethical and societal risks. Deepfakes and synthetic media now make it possible to fabricate events, statements, and identities with unprecedented realism. In elections, AI-generated disinformation can sway voter sentiment at scale, as seen in experimental campaigns where synthetic videos altered perceptions of candidates. The psychological impact is severe: repeated exposure to fabricated realities erodes trust, fosters confusion, and undermines confidence in institutions. Surveillance capitalism compounds these threats. Companies like Meta and Alphabet collect vast behavioral

The Cambridge Analytica scandal revealed how psychographic profiling could micro-target voters with tailored disinformation—transforming the will of many into a manipulable dataset. This raises urgent questions about data sovereignty, consent, and the right to cognitive autonomy. Another critical risk is the rise of “algorithmic authoritarianism,” where states use AI-driven surveillance and social scoring to monitor and control populations. China’s social credit system exemplifies this, rewarding compliance and punishing dissent through automated judgments. While framed as social harmony, such systems suppress pluralism, reinforcing homogeneity at the expense of diversity and dissent. Globally, the disinformation ecosystem includes state-sponsored troll farms, foreign interference campaigns, and domestic echo chambers—all eroding shared reality. In democracies, this fragmentation hinders consensus-building on critical issues like climate policy or public health. In autocracies, it consolidates control by discrediting opposition and amplifying nationalist narratives. The result is a world where facts are contested, truth is politicized, and collective action is increasingly difficult.

Geopolitical Comparisons: Models of Will Formation Across Regimes

The expression of the will of many varies dramatically across political systems, reflecting divergent values, histories, and governance models.
