In Kenya, early iterations were pioneered by youth-led collectives like *Msheria za Mtu* (Youth Mirror), who paired local oral traditions with contemporary digital storytelling. These readings were not confined to churches or schools; they occurred in street corners, refugee camps, and community centers—spaces where formal education often failed to reach, but where connection thrived. The format emphasized interactivity: after a passage on displacement or identity, participants shared personal stories, interrupted with questions, or reinterpreted lines in real time. This created a dialectic between text and audience, transforming reading from passive consumption into communal witness. By the mid-2010s, the model had crossed borders, carried by diaspora networks and digital platforms. In Rio de Janeiro's favelas, *Leituras Responsivas* adapted the

practice to address police violence and economic precarity, using texts by Brazilian writers like Conceição Evaristo and João Guimarães Rosa, layered with recordings of local youth speaking in Portuguese and Portuguese creoles. In Jakarta, *Pertarungan Muda* (Youth Spark) fused digital animation with traditional *wayang* storytelling, creating responsive readings that addressed climate anxiety and digital alienation—problems acutely felt in Southeast Asia’s rapidly urbanizing societies. And how do we avoid tokenism—using youth voices to appear progressive without ceding real agency? Risks are both practical and philosophical.
