Social media platforms saw snippets of the guide repurposed to support revisionist claims or provoke outrage, often distorting its intent. Educators reported instances where excerpts were shared without guidance, leading to student confusion or emotional harm. These incidents underscored the need for robust teacher training and digital literacy components within curriculum support.

The guide's risk profile thus reflects a paradox: its universality is both its strength and its vulnerability. In attempting to transcend borders, it must navigate local sensitivities; in promoting shared humanity, it risks oversimplification. These tensions demand adaptive governance—curricula that are globally informed but locally responsive, ethically grounded yet politically aware.

Global Comparisons: Memory Education Across Atrocities
