Yet, epidemiological data reveal stark regional disparities: higher detection rates in high-income nations stem not only from superior imaging access but from systematic neonatal cardiac screening programs—programs often absent in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). In sub-Saharan Africa and parts of South Asia, ASDs remain underdiagnosed, with many patients presenting in adulthood with heart failure, arrhythmias, or stroke—conditions misattributed to aging or poor access to care. From a geopolitical and economic standpoint, the burden of ASD reflects broader inequities in global health infrastructure. In high-income

nations, especially the U.S. and Western Europe, ASD management is characterized by multidisciplinary care, advanced imaging (transesophageal echocardiography, cardiac MRI), and minimally invasive closure techniques—often via transcatheter delivery of occlusion devices.
