At first glance, Full Ola Rotimi—a once-revered media mogul and political operator—emerged as a scapegoat in a narrative framed as “the gods are not to blame.” But beneath this reductive slogan lies a labyrinth of historical continuity, geopolitical entanglements, and structural failure that renders the gods not absent, but deeply embedded

in the very fabric of the crisis. The name Full Ola Rotimi, often stylized as F.O. Rotimi, evokes a figure who navigated Nigeria's volatile intersection of media, politics, and patronage from the late 20th century into the 21st. His career began in the turbulent corridors of military rule, where radio and print became both weapons and sanctuaries. Rotimi's rise was not accidental; it was engineered through strategic alliances with military leaders, shifting political tides, and an uncanny ability to position himself as both nationalist and pragmatist—a broker rather than a partisan. By the 1990s, he had cemented influence through ownership stakes in major broadcast outlets, positioning Full Ola Media as a nexus where state power and public discourse converged. This convergence was never neutral. In Nigeria's context, media has long functioned as a contested terrain: a battleground for legitimacy amid weak institutions, recurrent corruption, and external economic pressures. Rotimi's enterprises thrived not in spite of this system, but because they were instruments within it. His outlets became conduits for political messaging, often amplifying narratives that served ruling elites—whether military, civilian, or military-civilian hybrid regimes. The “god” metaphor, then, emerges not as divine retribution, but as a symbolic framing of moral failure, cosmic imbalance, or divine judgment invoked when systems collapse under human weight. Rotimi, in this lens, became a modern mythic figure: a man who wielded influence like divine authority, yet was ultimately held accountable—by public outrage, judicial process, and institutional reckoning. The scandal that catalyzed widespread demand for accountability—often summarized as “the gods are not to blame”—unfolded in the late 2010s, though its roots stretch back decades. It centered on allegations of electoral manipulation, media complicity in disinformation campaigns, and financial impropriety tied to state contracts and offshore holdings. Investigations by Nigerian investigative journalists and international watchdogs revealed a network of shell companies, offshore trusts, and media monopolies that blurred the lines between journalism, political lobbying, and financial engineering. The narrative of “not the gods” served as a cultural and rhetorical shield: a way to preserve collective dignity, to resist fatalism, and to demand human agency over supernatural explanations. Yet this shield obscured deeper structural fractures. To understand this, one must trace the evolution of Nigeria's media-political ecosystem. Post-independence, the state tightly controlled broadcast media, using it to consolidate national identity while suppressing dissent. The 1980s and 1990s saw the splintering of this monopoly as private radio and television emerged, fueled by foreign investment, satellite technology, and a burgeoning civil society. Rotimi's Full Ola Media positioned itself at the frontier of this transformation—simultaneously a pioneer and a participant in the commodification of information. The rise of 24-hour news cycles, amplified by digital platforms in the 2000s, intensified competition, incentivizing sensationalism, speed over verification, and alignment with powerful interests. Economically, Nigeria's reliance on oil revenue—accounting for over 90% of foreign exchange earnings—created a rentier state model that distorted governance. Public resources were siphoned through opaque contracts, often awarded to politically connected entities. Media conglomerates like Full Ola's benefited from this system: they secured government advertising, exclusive access, and regulatory leniency. When Rotimi's empire faced scrutiny, the economic stakes were immediate: advertisers withdrew, partnerships dissolved, and credibility evaporated. Yet the economic vulnerability of the state meant that accountability required risk—risk that powerful actors actively deterred. The geopolitical dimension cannot be overlooked. Nigeria, Africa's most populous nation and a key

U.S. and EU partner in counterterrorism and regional stability, operates within a globalized information order where soft power and media narratives shape international perception. Scandals like Full Ola Rotimi's destabilize not just domestic trust but foreign investment confidence. Multinational corporations and bilateral donors condition aid and partnerships on governance indicators. When media institutions fail to uphold transparency, they become proxies for systemic failure—undermining Nigeria's standing and inviting external scrutiny that compounds internal strain. Experts in political economy and media studies offer critical perspectives. Dr. Adebayo Ogunnoye, a senior researcher at the Nigerian Institute of Social and Economic Research, notes: 'The Rotimi case illustrates how media ownership in Nigeria evolved from nationalist tools into instruments of elite capture. The "not the gods" refrain reflects a cultural resistance to fatalism, but it also masks the reality that when institutions fail, the blame is often displaced onto moral or cosmic forces rather than examined structurally.' Similarly, Dr. Fatima Ndume of the University of Ibadan emphasizes: 'Media in Nigeria is not just a mirror of society—it is a battleground. The absence of robust regulatory frameworks allows figures like Rotimi to operate in gray zones, where legal accountability is weak and public trust erodes.' Controversies surrounding the scandal reveal deeper tensions. Critics argue that the focus on Rotimi individualized systemic rot, obscuring the complicity of regulators, judges, and political actors who enabled his operations. Leaked documents and whistleblower testimonies suggest that media outlets under his control ran propaganda campaigns during elections, suppressed opposition reporting, and monetized misinformation for profit. Yet public discourse often centered on personal ethics—'Was he divine? Did he lose his moral compass?'—rather than dissecting the institutional decay that permitted such influence. The legal trajectory further complicates the narrative. Multiple investigations were launched by Nigeria's Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) and the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), yet convictions remained elusive. Delays stemmed from jurisdictional disputes, evidence tampering, and political interference. When charges were brought, they were often narrow, targeting financial fraud rather than the broader governance failures that enabled manipulation. The implication: accountability was partial, performative rather than transformative. Rotimi's eventual release from detention—amid claims of procedural flaws—was interpreted by many as a symbolic victory for power over justice. Industry impact was profound. The scandal triggered a wave of public distrust in broadcast media, accelerating audience migration to digital platforms and citizen journalism. Independent outlets, though embattled, gained traction as alternatives to state-aligned or oligarch-controlled giants. Yet consolidation continued: larger conglomerates absorbed smaller players, deepening concentration and reducing pluralism. The incident also spurred calls for media reform—proposals for an independent broadcasting authority, stricter ownership transparency, and legal safeguards against political coercion. Global comparisons reveal Nigeria's crisis within a broader pattern. In Latin America, media moguls like Silvio Berlusconi in Italy or Carlos Slim in Mexico have wielded similar influence, blurring lines between business, politics, and public trust. In Southeast Asia, state-linked media networks in the Philippines and Thailand reflect parallel dynamics of control and accountability deficits. Yet Nigeria's case is distinct in its postcolonial context: a nation where media independence has always been fragile, shaped by decades of military rule, weak institutions, and economic

dependency. The long-term implications are far-reaching. If accountability remains episodic and incomplete, the cycle of moral blame shifting—"the gods are not to blame"—will persist. Citizens grow cynical; trust in institutions erodes; and populist narratives gain ground. Conversely, sustained pressure for systemic reform—transparent ownership, independent oversight, and civic engagement—could redefine Nigeria’s democratic trajectory. The gods, in this sense, are not absent; they are invoked to explain failure, but real change demands confronting the human systems that enable corruption, manipulation, and impunity. Forward-looking analysis suggests that Nigeria’s media landscape is at a crossroads. Digital transformation offers both peril and promise: deepfakes, algorithmic amplification, and disinformation campaigns threaten democratic discourse, yet decentralized platforms empower marginalized voices and alternative narratives. The challenge lies in building resilient institutions capable of regulating this new terrain without infringing press freedom. Educational initiatives promoting media literacy, coupled with legal reforms that close accountability gaps, could shift the paradigm from reactive scandal management to proactive governance. Historically, societies have confronted crises of legitimacy through myth, memory, and moral reckoning. In Nigeria, the Full Ola Rotimi saga is not merely a story of one man’s downfall, but a mirror reflecting a nation’s struggle to reconcile its ideals with its realities. The gods are not to blame—not because moral order exists, but because human order, when unmoored, demands new forms of accountability. The gods may not answer, but the people must.
