The interviewer—a special education coordinator or district auditor—seeks evidence of procedural rigor, documentation practices, and legal literacy. In contrast, in Nordic countries like Finland, where education is rooted in equity and trust, interviews emphasize relational competence. Questions probe empathy, collaborative problem-solving, and long-term student relationships: “Can you describe how you build trust with a nonverbal student?” or “How do you involve families as equal partners in IEP planning?” The Nordic model reflects a cultural ethos where teaching is viewed as a profession of care, not just expertise. Here, the interview assesses emotional intelligence and systemic humility. In East Asian contexts such as South Korea or Japan, where academic performance is culturally paramount, interviews may focus on balancing inclusion with academic rigor. Teachers are asked: “How do you support students with disabilities without compromising high expectations?” or “What strategies do you use to integrate students into mainstream classrooms without diluting their learning?” These questions reveal a tension between universal standards and individual needs—a tension increasingly visible in global education policy debates. A comparative lens reveals that interview content is not arbitrary. It reflects the dominant ideology of education: whether it prioritizes compliance, individualization, equity, or excellence—each shaping how teachers are assessed and supported.

In contrast, Germany’s dual vocational-special education system emphasizes early intervention and classroom integration, with interviews focusing on co-teaching models and collaboration with occupational therapists. Here, the teacher’s role as a system integrator is paramount. In India, where special education is still emerging, interviews often center on resource constraints. Questions probe improvisation: “How do you support a student with multiple disabilities with limited materials?” This highlights resilience but also systemic gaps.
