The play's innovative format forces the audience to reconsider the cause-and-effect relationships typically expected in storytelling. The characters' monologues reveal how betrayal is not just a singular act but a complex interplay of secrets, lies, and shifting loyalties. This theme of betrayal parallels the power dynamics observed in *\*Old Times\** and *\*No Man's Land\**. In these plays, the past looms large, and the characters wield memories as weapons to assert dominance or control. The betrayal is often psychological rather than overt, embedded in omissions, half-truths, and the manipulation of narrative.
