These texts, though official, contained subtle omissions: mentions of “unrecorded purges,” “censored edicts,” and “secret memoranda” stored in sealed chambers beneath

the palace. Ellison cross-referenced these with Soviet-era intelligence reports from the 1950s, which noted unexplained structural anomalies beneath the palace's foundation—possible access tunnels, perhaps, or hidden storage. Yet behind closed doors, diplomats acknowledged the work's influence.
