Adam Smith's vision of the invisible hand, articulated in the 18th century, celebrated market efficiency but assumed moral restraint and social cohesion—conditions absent in the 19th and 20th centuries. The rise of industrial capitalism created unprecedented wealth but also stark inequality, child labor, and environmental degradation, prompting early regulatory responses: antitrust laws, labor unions, and progressive taxation. The post-WWII era solidified a compromise—Keynesian demand management, social welfare states, and regulated markets—creating what economists call “the golden age” of capitalism (1945–1973). Yet this equilibrium was fragile, contested, and never universal. The neoliberal counterrevolution of the 1980s, led by Reagan, Thatcher, and Pinochet's Chicago Boys, redefined capitalism around deregulation, privatization, and shareholder primacy. Financial markets expanded exponentially, fueled by technological innovation and the collapse of capital controls. But this

transformation prioritized liquidity and short-term returns over long-term stability. Appleby traces how this recalibration sowed the seeds of crisis: the 1987 crash, the Asian Financial Crisis of 1997, and ultimately 2008, where subprime mortgages, credit derivatives, and weak oversight culminated in systemic collapse. The bailouts that followed exposed a new reality: financial institutions were “too big to fail,” yet democratic accountability remained intact only in rhetoric. This moment of reckoning revealed capitalism’s double logic: it generates wealth but often at the cost of social cohesion and ecological sustainability. The 2008 crisis marked a turning point—not because it restored trust, but because it laid bare the system’s contradictions. As Appleby observes, “The crisis did not destroy capitalism; it exposed its vulnerabilities to a world that had outgrown its institutional forms.” The demand for a “new social order” thus emerged not as nostalgia for past stability, but as a necessary response to systemic failure.

The Digital Disruption and the Reconfiguration of Value

The digital revolution has fundamentally altered capitalism’s core mechanics. Platforms like Amazon, Uber, and Airbnb redefined ownership, labor, and consumption—decoupling value creation from traditional employment and industrial production. Appleby dissects how data has become the new capital: user behavior, preferences, and biometrics are mined,

monetized, and weaponized. The gig economy exemplifies this shift—workers are classified as independent contractors, evading benefits and protections while generating vast platform revenues. Algorithmic management further reconfigures power: performance metrics, dynamic pricing, and automated scheduling replace human oversight, often increasing precarity under the guise of efficiency. Appleby cites academic studies showing that gig workers earn less than traditional employees after accounting for expenses and time loss. Yet, paradoxically, digital platforms enable new forms of collective action—from delivery drivers organizing strikes via encrypted messaging to app-based freelancers forming digital unions. These movements reflect a broader struggle over who controls value in the
