A 2022 study by the International Transport Forum found that women using public transit in low-income cities report higher rates of harassment than men, with many avoiding travel altogether to escape trauma. The story of Blanche is not confined to New Orleans or New York. In Lagos, the *danfo* minibuses and streetcars carry women whose lives are shaped by economic survival and gendered violence. In Mexico City, women report heightened anxiety during late-night transit due to persistent harassment.
