The case of Tibetan Buddhism’s political symbolism, or the mythic framing of Indigenous land rights in Latin America, illustrates how sacred narratives can become

Bhutan, for instance, has institutionalized Buddhist values into governance through its Gross National Happiness index, demonstrating how spiritual identity can be integrated without total isolation.

Economically, the phenomenon intersects with the rise of belief-driven markets. The digital economy has enabled new forms of sacred capital: virtual temples, NFT-based rituals, and blockchain-secured spiritual contracts. Projects claiming divine legitimacy now issue digital assets tied to mythic narratives, creating economies where belief is both currency and commodity. This fusion has attracted both visionary entrepreneurs and opportunistic speculators. While some communities use these tools to preserve tradition and fund development, others risk reducing sacred meaning to market value—raising ethical

questions about authenticity and commodification.

Documentary filmmakers and narrative creators mine the archetype for compelling stories, blending fact and myth to explore identity and belonging.
