century Codex Sinaiticus and the 5th-century Codex Vaticanus, confirm a remarkably stable core text, suggesting rapid canonization and widespread use. Yet the Gospel's transmission was shaped by ideological contestation. During the Patristic era, Church Fathers like Origen and Augustine interpreted Matthew allegorically to reconcile Christianity with Greco-Roman philosophy, while later medieval scribes emphasized its literal, prophetic clarity to support papal authority and crusading zeal. The Counter-Reformation saw Matthew's genealogy meticulously linked to Davidic legitimacy, reinforcing Catholic claims to spiritual continuity. In the modern era, critical scholarship—fueled by form criticism, source analysis (e.g., the Use Method, the Q source), and historical Jesus research—has repositioned Matthew not as a neutral chronicler but as a theologian crafting a narrative of legitimacy in a hostile world. Matthew's portrayal of Jesus diverges sharply from the synoptic "other" Gospels. Here, Jesus is not merely a miracle worker but a sophisticated teacher of Torah, a political figure whose kingdom disrupts rather than replaces earthly power. The Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), a centerpiece of the Gospel, redefines righteousness not by ritual purity but by interior transformation—"you have heard... but I say to you"—a radical internalization of commandment that challenges both Jewish legalism and Roman moral relativism. This ethical vision, rooted in Hebrew prophetic tradition yet reconceived through Christian revelation, offered a countercultural framework for a people stripped of statehood. The Gospel's geopolitical implications extend far beyond 1st-century Judea. Medieval European Christendom internalized Matthew's cosmic vision—the "birth of a new sky and earth" (Matthew 1:3)—as a justification for divine-right monarchy and crusading expansion. The doctrine of the "Two Kingdoms" (spiritual above temporal) derived from Matthew's tension between earthly suffering and heavenly promise. In the early modern period, Protestant reformers like Luther and Calvin mined Matthew's emphasis on faith over works to challenge Catholic sacramentalism, reshaping European religious and political landscapes. The Gospel's call to "make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19) became both a missionary mandate and a tool of colonial ideology, complicating its legacy with ambivalence. Matthew’s portrayal of Jesus as both a teacher and a disruptor of authority—challenging Pharisaic legalism, subverting temple economics, and advocating radical hospitality—can be read as a theological response to systemic oppression. The Sower’s journey through hostile terrain (Matthew 13:1–23) mirrors the movement of a persecuted people seeking sanctuary in faith. The Gospel’s geopolitical messaging evolved with its audience. Early communities in Jerusalem, likely composed of Jewish Christians, faced both Jewish rejection and Roman scrutiny. Later, as Christianity spread to Gentile communities in Asia Minor, Greece, and Rome, Matthew’s emphasis on the Kingdom’s universality (e.g., “all nations” in 28:19) softened its Jewish-specific framing, enabling broader appeal while preserving its covenantal core. This adaptability allowed Matthew to survive and thrive amid shifting political landscapes—from persecuted sect to state religion under Constantine, and beyond.
