Early chapters on accommodations prioritized mid-century resorts backed by mainland investors—Halekulani, The Royal Hawaiian—framing luxury as the natural progression of Hawaiian development. The guide’s economic projections, optimistic and uncritical, assumed steady growth in international tourism as the primary engine of prosperity, sidelining concerns about dependency and cultural erosion.

Geopolitical Undercurrents and the Strategic Value of Tourism

As a U.S. state since 1959, Hawaii occupies a unique position—geographically midway between North America and Asia, militarily critical with Pearl Harbor, and symbolically central to American influence in the Pacific. The Blue Guide Book, published just four years after statehood, subtly reflected this strategic calculus. Its chapters on transport networks, visa facilitation, and cultural attractions were designed not only to attract leisure travelers, but to reinforce America’s soft power in a region where Cold War rivalries with the Soviet Union and later China were intensifying. By the 1970s, the guide’s editors began incorporating military and intelligence references—discreetly—acknowledging Hawaii’s role as a U.S. Pacific command hub. This

convergence of tourism and defense has deepened over time. Yet this success is shadowed by strategic vulnerabilities: overreliance on international visitors from China and Japan makes the economy sensitive to geopolitical friction. In interviews conducted for the 2021 revision, elders and cultural practitioners collaborated with guide editors to co-develop “Living Traditions” modules—interactive sections teaching visitors proper kapu (sacred) protocols, language phrases, and land stewardship ethics. These efforts, though nascent, suggest a shift toward relational representation rather than extractive documentation. Critics, however, caution against performative inclusion. A 2022 expose in revealed that some “authentic” experiences promoted in the guide still exclude Indigenous decision-making, with local guides often relegated to scripted roles rather than leadership. The tension

remains: can a state-sanctioned guide ever fully transcend its colonial and commercial origins?

Controversies and Risks: From Environmental Degradation to Cultural Appropriation

The Blue Guide Book's legacy is marred by tangible risks. Environmental scientists cite its early promotion of large-scale resort development as a catalyst for coastal erosion, coral bleaching, and freshwater depletion. The 1980s saw the Mauna Lani Resort's expansion—chronicled in the guide as a model of luxury eco-design—lead to irreversible damage to native dune ecosystems, prompting lawsuits and public outcry. Cultural appropriation has also been a persistent concern. The guide's portrayal of hula as a static, performative art—rather than a living, evolving practice—contributed to its commercialization and dilution. Activists like Kahea Grace Kelly have documented how sacred chants and body adornments were reduced to tourist photo ops, stripping them of spiritual meaning. Moreover, the guide's economic centrality has bred vulnerability. The 2020 pandemic laid bare Hawaii's overdependence on tourism: over 80,000 jobs vanished overnight, and local businesses—from family-owned restaurants to traditional fishponds—faced extinction. The guide's post-pandemic editions have responded with cautious optimism, promoting “slow tourism” and “regenerative travel,” yet the transition remains fraught with political and logistical hurdles.

National Tourism Organization guides) emphasize cultural heritage and seasonal rituals, reflecting a post-war emphasis on soft power and tradition. South Africa's similarly leverages natural and cultural diversity to promote reconciliation and economic integration. Yet Hawaii's case is unique. Its evolution mirrors broader shifts: from mid-century optimism to 21st-century reckoning with sustainability, equity, and sovereignty. The guide's blue cover, once a symbol of welcoming, now carries layered meanings—freedom, fragility, resilience. It speaks not only of beaches and surf, but of colonial legacies, economic precarity, and the struggle to define Hawaii on its own terms.

Simultaneously, shifting demographics and geopolitical realignments demand deeper cultural nuance. As Pacific Island nations assert greater autonomy and China's influence grows, Hawaii's identity as a 'bridge' between East and West may require reimagining. The guide could evolve into a platform for cross-cultural dialogue—highlighting Indigenous voices not as footnotes, but as central narrators. Technological integration offers another frontier.
