In state-run conservatories from Moscow to Beijing, curricula emphasize canonical works—Bach, Beethoven, Tchaikovsky—not out of pure aesthetic reverence, but because they

represent sanctioned narratives of national identity. In authoritarian or highly centralized systems, deviation from these canonized works can be interpreted as ideological dissent. A student who questions why Bach's counterpoint is privileged over a Soviet-era folk symphony is not merely learning music—they are being schooled in a political ontology where music's purpose is defined by power. The lie, repeated across generations, is that art exists in a vacuum of pure expression, when in reality it is always embedded in systems of authority. The teacher's statement also confronts the economic logic underpinning the global music industry. The shift from physical sales to streaming has not democratized access—it has intensified control. Platforms like Spotify and Apple Music aggregate billions of plays, but their algorithms operate as invisible curators, favoring familiarity, engagement metrics, and commercial viability. A song's "authenticity" is now measured not by emotional resonance, but by click-through rates, playlist inclusions, and viral momentum. Independent artists, once hailed as rebels, increasingly find themselves optimized to fit algorithmic templates—short intros, predictable hooks, instant emotional payoff. The lie deepens: music is no longer a vessel of cultural meaning, but a data point in a system designed to extract attention and profit. The teacher's silence on this point is telling—a silence born not of ignorance, but of recognition that the real control lies not in censorship, but in commodification. Yet this commodification is not new; it is merely a digital evolution of an old regime. In the early 20th century, Tin Pan Alley publishers and radio broadcasters controlled access to audiences, deciding which songs became national anthems and which faded into obscurity. The teacher's warning about "lies" resonates in this lineage: every song that reaches global prominence is the product of strategic curation, financial backing, and narrative framing. The "authentic" folk revival of the 1960s, the hip-hop explosion of the '80s, and the K-pop global conquest of the 2010s—all were propelled not just by talent, but by deliberate cultural

engineering. The lie is not that music is commercial, but that it is ever truly free from it. The geopolitical dimensions of musical control are stark. In China, the state's influence over music is explicit. The Ministry of Culture approves repertoire for state orchestras, censors lyrics deemed subversive, and promotes "positive energy" anthems. Independent artists face surveillance, while state-sanctioned pop stars become cultural ambassadors—performing at international events, their music broadcast as soft power. The teacher's implication—that music is a site of ideological negotiation—finds its most acute expression here. Similarly, in Russia today, post-2022, classical music remains a tool of national pride, while underground genres like punk and experimental electronic music are marginalized or banned. The control of sound becomes a proxy for control of identity. In contrast, Western democracies present a more diffuse but no less pervasive form of control. The dominance of Anglo-American pop culture, amplified by global media conglomerates, creates a monoculture where local voices struggle to gain traction unless they conform to marketable archetypes. The teacher's observation about "lies" thus extends to the narrative that diversity in music is organic and inevitable. In reality, it is sustained through deliberate policy—grant funding skewed toward mainstream genres, streaming playlists curated by AI trained on historical data that privileges Western norms, and awards systems that reward accessibility over innovation. The lie is that the global music landscape is a free market of ideas; it is, in fact, a curated hierarchy where visibility is a currency. Expert perspectives deepen this analysis. Dr. Tariq Ramadan, in his work on cultural sovereignty, argues that "authenticity is not static tradition but living memory—contested, negotiated, and reclaimed." This aligns with the teacher's insight: authenticity is not inherent, but constructed through struggle. Dr. Angela Davis, speaking on art and resistance, emphasizes that "when institutions control the narrative of music, they control the narrative of dissent." This is evident in the suppression of protest songs in Iran, where artists like

Mohsen Namjoon face arrest for lyrical critique, versus the co-opted anthems of regime-sanctioned celebrations. The teacher’s statement thus reveals music as a battleground—not just of sound, but of meaning. The risks of this system are profound. When music is reduced to data points or ideological instruments, creativity becomes constrained. Emerging artists face pressure to conform, innovation is stifled, and cultural fragmentation deepens. The teacher’s lie—that music exists outside control—is a dangerous illusion. Because denial of control enables its consolidation. The rise of generative AI in music creation amplifies this danger: algorithms trained on existing datasets
