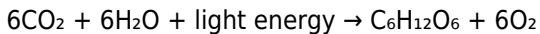

It also introduces emerging technologies, prompting discussion on bioengineering, carbon sequestration, and ethical boundaries. This reframing is not without controversy. Critics argue that such depth risks overwhelming younger learners, particularly in contexts where standardized testing prioritizes memorization over inquiry. Others warn of ideological tensions: framing photosynthesis through a climate crisis lens may be
