Biotech and pharma present another paradigm. Here, valuation centers on pipeline potential—clinical trial success, regulatory approval pathways, and patent cliffs. The 2023 acquisition of Recursion Pharmaceuticals by Bayer, valued at \$2.1 billion, reflected confidence in its AI-driven drug discovery platform, even though no near-term revenue existed. This premium underscores a shift: valuation now rewards capability, not just pipeline stages. Energy transition further complicates the picture. As decarbonization accelerates, traditional oil and gas firms face valuation headwinds,
