These texts were composed in a world where oral tradition reigned, and literacy was limited. Their authors were not neutral chroniclers but embedded within communities navigating persecution, theological innovation, and political upheaval. Mark, likely the earliest, reflects a community under pressure—perhaps in Rome or Syria—framing Jesus through the lens of suffering and urgency. Matthew, written for a Jewish-Christian audience,

reinterprets Jesus as the new Moses, fulfilling scripture while asserting continuity with Hebrew tradition. Luke, composed in Greek for a broader, Gentile-leaning audience, emphasizes Jesus' compassion for the poor, women, and outcasts, reflecting the cosmopolitan ethos of the Roman East. John, the most theologically sophisticated, emerged from a later, increasingly Gentile context, elevating Jesus as the eternal Word—Logos—bridging divine and human realms. The evolution of these texts was neither linear nor static. From the 2nd century onward, the canon began to solidify, yet debate raged over authenticity, authority, and orthodoxy. The Muratorian Fragment (c. 170 CE), one of the earliest known lists of Christian scriptures, already reflects canonical tensions—exclusion of canonical gospels like *Gospel of Peter* or *Gospel of Judas* (the latter later reclaimed in Gnostic circles). The canon's final shape was not decreed by divine decree but by political consensus, shaped by church councils such as Nicaea (325 CE) and Chalcedon (451 CE), where theological orthodoxy became a tool of imperial unity under Constantine. The Gospels were thus not merely discovered but curated—selected, translated, and standardized to serve ecclesiastical and political agendas. The geopolitical context of this process cannot be overstated. The Roman Empire, having crushed Jewish rebellions and suppressed uprisings, sought stability through religious conformity. Christianity, initially a

marginalized sect, was co-opted as the state religion by 380 CE, transforming it from a persecuted movement into an imperial institution. Their dissemination relied on the very infrastructure of Roman roads, literacy networks, and monastic scribes—many embedded in imperial administration. Luther’s translation of the Bible into German was not merely linguistic; it was a revolutionary act, severing the priestly monopoly on sacred texts and empowering lay

Wright offer contrasting lenses: Ehrman, a skeptic, emphasizes textual corruption and human agency, while Wright defends a balanced historicity, arguing that while the Gospels are theological interpretations, they preserve genuine memories of Jesus within their cultural context. In the Global South, local theologians reinterpret Gospel narratives through indigenous cosmologies—embedding Jesus in African messianic traditions or Asian philosophical frameworks. In contested regions like Palestine, Israel, and Lebanon, scriptural claims become entangled with national identity, land rights, and political legitimacy—Gospel narratives invoked in both peacebuilding and sectarian mobilization. Risks abound in this interpretive terrain. Misuse of biblical texts to justify violence, exclusion, or authoritarianism remains a persistent danger. The rise of digital media amplifies both access and distortion: viral social media interpretations often reduce nuanced theology to slogans, while algorithmic echo chambers entrench dogmatism.
