Research by Dr. Elena Volkov at Moscow State University demonstrates that multilingual learners often process text non-linearly, jumping between languages and visual cues—patterns the original booklet fails to accommodate. Volkov's work supports calls for adaptive, multimodal assessments that reflect the cognitive complexity of global learners.

Controversies and Risks: Equity, Access, and Cognitive Overload

The BRI has not escaped controversy. Human rights organizations have criticized its repeated use in high-stakes evaluations, particularly in countries where literacy outcomes determine access to secondary education. In Nigeria’s 2019 educational reforms, for example, BRI-based screening led to mass retention of children deemed “low readers,” sparking protests over labeling and stigma.
