For Sadako, this rupture was immediate: she contracted leukemia at age 11, a direct consequence of radiation exposure, and would die on October 25, 1955, at just ten years old. Yet, within the sterile corridors of her hospital bed, surrounded by medical charts and the quiet hum of machines, Sadako folded paper. She had been inspired by a childhood memory of folding cranes—legendary figures in Japanese folklore said to live for a thousand years if crafted with devotion and pure intent. In her fragile hands, the crane became a ritual of defiance against silence, a physical assertion of life amid death. Her story begins not with myth, but with medicine: the leukemia diagnosis was the catalyst, but the origami crane was the act of resistance.
