This stance resonated in a moment when social media began to amplify both empowerment and surveillance, where authenticity became both currency and weapon. Yet the Brown Bunny was never a static symbol. Sevigny's collaborations with avant-garde filmmakers—such as **The Brown Bunny** (2003), her self-directed film shot in a single continuous take—pushed formal boundaries, blending documentary realism with poetic abstraction. The film, a meditation on time, memory, and bodily endurance, was simultaneously a manifesto and a critique. It rejected linear narrative in favor of sensory immersion, echoing the fragmented temporality of digital life. This work, though critically lauded, was commercially niche, underscoring the persistent tension between artistic integrity and market viability.
