A young guide with passion and knowledge can be blocked by red tape. We’re not asking for handouts—just fair access, better training, and recognition of our role as stewards.” His frustration mirrors a broader sentiment among independent operators who contend with rising licensing fees, mandatory insurance premiums that can exceed \$10,000 annually, and rigid scheduling requirements that conflict with seasonal hunting patterns. Risks associated with

In contrast, Louisiana's system remains predominantly state-managed, with limited integration of Indigenous or

community-based governance models—despite the presence of numerous Native American and Creole communities with deep ecological ties.
