Once a Soviet powerhouse in space, nuclear physics, and cryogenics, Russia's research infrastructure has degraded under sanctions and underfunding. Yet Moscow continues to prioritize strategic domains—nuclear deterrence, cyber warfare, and space-based surveillance—not out of ideological fervor alone, but as survival mechanisms in a hostile international order. The war in Ukraine has accelerated this trend, with both sides weaponizing scientific knowledge: drones guided by AI, cyberattacks disrupting lab networks, and satellite imagery shaping battlefield decisions. Technology, supports startups in agritech and renewable energy, aiming to turn research into scalable solutions for its vast population. Brazil's push for bioeconomy development leverages its biodiversity, though bureaucratic inertia and political volatility often slow progress.
