India’s recent push toward national assessment frameworks, such as the National Achievement Survey, reflects a similar effort to balance global competitiveness with domestic equity. This tension—between universal metrics and cultural specificity—defines the current landscape, revealing assessment not as a neutral arbiter, but as a site of cultural negotiation and political assertion. Economically, the stakes have escalated. In an era defined by knowledge economies and automation, assessment tests have evolved into gatekeepers of opportunity.
