The Vatican, too, supported astronomical research through the Jesuit colleges, where scholars like Christoph Clavius (1537–1612) synthesized classical geometry with emerging algebraic techniques, further refining methods for tracking changing quantities. The evolution from fragmented geometric insight to formalized calculus was neither linear nor singular. Japan’s Edo period (1603–1868) later adopted Dutch **Rangaku** (Dutch learning), including European mathematics, but the 1500s in Europe were the true genesis. Long-term implications are staggering.
