His early work with Josef Breuer on "hysteria" revealed patterns of symptom formation rooted not in organic pathology but in traumatic psychic events—events buried, distorted, and reworked into neuroses. This insight crystallized into the core thesis of psychoanalysis: that unconscious processes,



though inaccessible to direct introspection, manifest through slips, dreams,
