The Atlantic seaboard, shaped by glacial outwash and barrier island systems, faces accelerating erosion and saltwater intrusion, threatening both natural habitats and human settlements from Maine to Florida. These coastal zones are not merely ecological but geopolitical: contested territories for fisheries management, offshore energy development, and migration routes, amplified by climate-induced displacement. Deep within the continent, the montane and alpine biomes—from the Sierra Nevada and Cascades to the Colorado Rockies—function as climate refugia and biodiversity hotspots. Elevated zones create vertical gradients where species migrate upslope in response to warming, yet face limited habitat as they reach "summit traps." These regions host endemic species like the whitebark pine, whose seeds sustain Clark's nutcrackers and grizzly bears, yet are imperiled by mountain pine beetles, fire suppression legacies, and climate shifts. Historically, Indigenous groups such as the Shoshone and Ute managed these high country through seasonal transhumance and controlled burns, maintaining ecological balance until colonial exclusion and conservation policies restricted access. Today, alpine zones are focal points for climate adaptation strategies, including assisted migration and genetic conservation. The biome of urban and anthropogenic landscapes—though often excluded from traditional ecological discourse—now constitutes a

dominant planetary surface. Metropolitan corridors from Toronto to Los Angeles, Shanghai to Mexico City, integrate infrastructure, energy grids, and waste systems across biomes, creating novel ecosystems shaped by heat islands, light pollution, and invasive species. These zones exemplify the Anthropocene's defining paradox: human-made environments that simultaneously degrade and sustain life. Smart growth initiatives, green roofs, and urban rewilding projects aim to reclaim ecological function, yet urban sprawl continues to fragment habitats and exacerbate biodiversity loss. The rise of megacities in biome transitions—such as Phoenix at the edge of the Sonoran or Vancouver nestled between Coast Mountains and Salish Sea—epitomizes the intensifying tension between development and ecological integrity. From a geopolitical and economic lens, North America's biomes are not passive backdrops but active agents in global resource flows. The boreal forest's timber and carbon credits feed international markets; the Great Plains' grain exports stabilize global food security; the Southwest's solar potential positions deserts as clean energy frontiers. Yet these economies are increasingly vulnerable: wildfires in Canada disrupt supply chains; droughts in Texas constrain grain production; coastal flooding in Louisiana threatens petrochemical infrastructure. The biomes thus become battlegrounds for energy transition, food sovereignty, and environmental justice, where Indigenous sovereignty, corporate interests, and state policy collide. Expert perspectives reveal a consensus on the urgency of rethinking biome governance. Ecologists stress the need for "bioregional planning"—a framework aligning administrative boundaries with ecological processes rather than political lines. Conservation biologists advocate for expanded protected areas, particularly in biodiversity hotspots like the Pacific Northwest and Appalachian forests, while warning that current coverage remains insufficient. Anthropologists emphasize that Indigenous knowledge systems, often marginalized in policy, offer proven models for sustainable coexistence. Economists highlight the rising cost of ecosystem degradation—estimated at trillions annually in lost services—and argue for natural capital accounting in national planning. Controversies persist, particularly around land use and climate adaptation. The debate

over “rewilding” versus “restoration” pits purist ecological goals against pragmatic, community-centered interventions. In the boreal, industrial logging and mining clash with Indigenous land rights and carbon stewardship. In the Great Plains, biofuel crops threaten native grasslands, while carbon capture initiatives risk greenwashing fossil fuel dependence. The Mojave’s solar farms spark conflict between renewable energy mandates and desert conservation, underscoring the challenge of scaling green infrastructure without ecological sacrifice. Risks to North America’s biomes are systemic and interconnected. Climate change accelerates biome shifts—boreal forests contracting, deserts expanding, tundra thawing—while invasive species, facilitated by global trade, disrupt native communities. Soil degradation, driven by intensive agriculture and erosion, reduces long-term productivity. Water stress, intensified by over-extraction and climate variability, threatens both human populations and aquatic ecosystems. These pressures are compounded by governance fragmentation: overlapping federal, state, tribal, and municipal authorities often hinder coordinated action. Globally, North America’s biomes serve as both cautionary tale and laboratory. The continent’s experience with large-scale ecosystem transformation—from tallgrass prairie to industrial agribusiness—parallels patterns in Eurasia and South America but is uniquely shaped by its vast size, diverse climates, and colonial history. Comparative studies show that regions with strong Indigenous land tenure, such as parts of Canada and the Amazon, exhibit greater resilience, suggesting that decolonizing environmental governance is not merely ethical but ecologically prudent. Looking forward, the long-term implications hinge on transformative adaptation. Projections indicate that by 2050, under moderate warming (2°C), the boreal may shift northward by 300–500 km, altering carbon dynamics and species ranges. The Southwest could see a 30–50% reduction in viable habitat for key species, demanding proactive assisted migration and habitat corridors. Coastal zones may lose 20–50% of wetlands by
