Jun’ichirō Tanizaki’s ‘The Key’ (1956) and Yasunari Kawabata’s ‘The Old Capital’ (1962) used sparse, poetic prose to explore desire, memory, and cultural erosion under post-war modernization. Meanwhile, in India, the partition of 1947 catalyzed a literary renaissance.
