The fossil fuel era entrenched energy hierarchies: petrostates like Saudi Arabia, Russia, and the U.S. Gulf Coast wielded disproportionate influence through resource control. Meanwhile, industrializing nations—China, India, and others—viewed access to affordable energy as a prerequisite for development, resisting rapid decarbonization demands that risk locking in inequality. The Paris Agreement (2015) attempted to reconcile these divides through Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), yet current pledges fall woefully short. The Global Carbon Project's 2023 report found global emissions plateaued at ~37 GtCO₂/year, but cumulative emissions since 1850 exceed 2,500 Gt—locking in committed warming unless net removal equals or exceeds that. Industry's response has been bifurcated. On one side, fossil fuel majors—Exxon, Chevron, Saudi Aramco—have doubled down on extraction, backed by lobbying and legal defense, framing carbon capture and storage (CCS) as salvation while expanding production. On the other, a transnational coalition of energy firms, tech innovators, and financial institutions has pivoted toward renewables, green hydrogen, and direct air capture (DAC), driven by both market opportunity and regulatory pressure. The shift is not uniform: while Europe and parts of North America accelerate deployment, emerging economies face a dual challenge—meeting energy access needs while avoiding carbon lock-in. The U.S. Inflation Reduction Act (2022) and EU Green Deal have spurred domestic manufacturing but risk fracturing global trade. Meanwhile, fossil fuel exporters face existential uncertainty: Norway invests in carbon capture and offshore wind, while Saudi Arabia pivots with NEOM’s hydrogen ambitions. The Global Carbon Budget 2024 highlights that without immediate, deep emissions cuts, the world is on track for 2.7°C by 2100—well beyond the Paris threshold of 1.5°C. Controversies persist, particularly around carbon accounting and justice. The concept of “carbon equivalence” remains contested: should emissions be attributed to production (where goods are made) or consumption (where goods are used)? China, for example, exports manufactured emissions to wealthy nations, raising questions of equity.
