modeling and peer discussion. Japan’s “reading workshop” model emphasizes guided inference through shared texts, prioritizing comprehension over speed. In contrast, in many Sub-Saharan African countries, context clues practice remains limited by teacher training gaps and textbook scarcity—though grassroots initiatives are now distributing open-source, community-created worksheets to close gaps. Long-term implications hinge on how societies value inference as a cornerstone of critical citizenship. As AI reshapes information consumption, the ability to parse context—detecting nuance, bias, and intent—grows ever more vital.
