The rise of joint-stock banks and insurance companies created new mechanisms for risk transfer, but also entrenched inequalities. Wealthy individuals and corporations could secure private healthcare and quarantine, while the poor remained dependent on underfunded public systems. The 1918 influenza pandemic revealed these fissures: urban centers with robust (if still inadequate) public health infrastructures saw lower mortality, while overcrowded tenements and war-ravaged regions suffered catastrophic

losses. Industrialization’s environmental toll further deepened vulnerability. Urban air and water pollution created chronic health burdens—lung disease, lead poisoning, waterborne illnesses—particularly among the poor. Davis notes that these were not mere side effects but central features of a system that valued production over human well-being. The same logic persists today: fossil fuel dependence fuels climate change, which intensifies heatwaves, floods, and vector-borne diseases, disproportionately affecting marginalized communities. Globally, the late Victorian era set precedents for how modern states manage crisis. Quarantine, surveillance, and public health mandates evolved from ad hoc responses to institutionalized tools—tools often wielded unequally. The 1892 International Sanitary Conference in Paris, convened to coordinate cholera and plague responses, laid groundwork for the World Health Organization, yet its early decisions reflected colonial hierarchies, marginalizing non-European voices. Davis argues that this legacy continues: global health governance often
