Walter Benjamin’s **The Work of Art in the Age of Mechanical Reproduction** (1936) reframed mimesis in terms of aura—the unique presence lost in copies—foreshadowing digital reproduction’s erosion of authenticity. Today,

mimesis extends into virtual worlds: video games simulate reality; AI generates hyperrealistic prose. The question remains: what does it mean to “imitate” when the line between original and simulation dissolves? Mimesis thus evolves from artistic fidelity to ontological inquiry—how do we represent truth in a post-truth era? *Genre politics* intersect with economic forces in ways that shape literary production and reception. The rise of the publishing industry in the 19th century—fueled by industrial printing, urbanization, and rising literacy—created a market-driven canon, privileging commercial viability over experimentation. Today, digital platforms and data analytics further reshape this dynamic: algorithms predict trends, recommendation engines curate tastes, and viral success often determines visibility. Literary scholar Safiya Umoja Noble’s **Algorithms of Oppression** (2018) exposes how search engines and social media reproduce racial, gendered, and class-based biases, limiting access for marginalized writers. Yet paradoxically, digital democratization enables unprecedented global reach—indie authors bypass gatekeepers, translators amplify non-Western voices, and fan fiction redefines adaptation. The economics of literature thus oscillate between concentration and fragmentation, between profit and public good, between algorithmic optimization and artistic integrity. Controversies surrounding these terms reflect deeper cultural fractures. The debate over **canon reform**—whether to include more women, people of color,

In authoritarian states, literary dissent becomes dangerous—writers silenced, banned, or exiled. Even in open societies, the precarity of literary careers pressures writers toward marketability over risk. The future of literary culture depends on sustaining spaces for experimentation, critical engagement, and inclusive voices—while defending the public good of the written word. Looking ahead, the evolution of literary words will be shaped by technology, migration, and ecological awareness. *Intermediality*—the fusion of text with audio,

visual, and interactive elements—will redefine literary experience. Blockchain may enable new models of authorship and ownership. Across borders, *translingual writing* and *translation studies* gain prominence, challenging monolingual norms and expanding access. Colonial powers exported this model globally, embedding European literary norms in education systems from India to Africa, often marginalizing oral traditions and indigenous epistemologies. Today, authority is contested—challenged by collective authorship, algorithmic curation, and decentralized digital publishing. But the legacy endures: literary institutions still wield immense power, shaping

canons, funding research, and defining legitimacy through peer review, prizes, and academic curricula.

Genre: From Classification to Resistance

The term **genre**—rooted in Latin **genus**, meaning birth or kind—evolved from ancient Greek **genos**, denoting lineage, to denote formal categories in literature. In 18th-century France, Diderot’s **Salons** systematized art into genres (painting, sculpture, drama), a model later applied to literature. By the 19th century, Victorian critics rigidly sorted works into “novel,” “poetry,” “drama,” reinforcing bourgeois values and excluding experimental forms. Yet genre has always been more than taxonomy: it is a social contract. As literary critic Gerard Genette noted, genre provides a “heuristic frame” that enables readers to navigate expectations. But this frame is not fixed—modernist writers like Virginia Woolf and James Joyce shattered genre boundaries, blending memoir, poetry, and stream-of-consciousness. Postmodernism radicalized this further, with works like Thomas Pynchon’s **Gravity’s Rainbow** collapsing history, fiction, and paranoia into a hybrid form. Yet even as genre becomes fluid, it retains power: publishers still market books by genre, readers rely on genre cues, and academic disciplines defend genre as a legitimate analytical tool. The tension lies in whether genre serves as a liberating

framework or a constraining norm—especially in a globalized world where non-Western narrative traditions resist Eurocentric classification.

Orality and the Hidden Architecture of Literature

Orality—the primacy of spoken word—predates writing by millennia, forming the foundational structure of human storytelling. The Greek **orality**, from **orallein** (to speak), was not primitive but a sophisticated system of mnemonic devices, repetition, and communal validation. Oral traditions rely on rhythm, formulaic expressions, and performative structure to preserve vast epics like Homer’s **Iliad** and **Odyssey**, transmitted across generations before being committed to parchment. Walter Ong’s work reveals that oral cultures cultivate a “secondary orality” in the digital age—where podcasts, social media, and spoken word events revive performative storytelling.
