The victims—initially identified through missing persons reports from states across the West—shared a chilling profile: transient individuals, undocumented laborers, and at-risk populations vulnerable to exploitation. Their bodies, discovered between July and September 2023 near the Salmon River and the Bitterroot Mountains, bore markings consistent with ritualistic severance, likely intended to obscure identity and deter investigation.
