Yet these demands clash with entrenched state interests. Bureaucratic inertia, legal complexity, and political expediency slow progress. Critics, including centrist policymakers, label her approach "divisive" or "unrealistic," fearing fragmentation. But Wright counters that the real danger lies in maintaining the status quo—a system that perpetuates dispossession under the guise of inclusion.
