The U.S. colonial administration, steeped in Progressive-era technocracy, deployed new visual epistemologies. Photographs, statistical tables, and illustrated reports became central to governance. The **Philippine Commission Reports**, widely disseminated in Washington and Manila, used charts to demonstrate “progress”—railroad expansion, public health gains, literacy rates—framed as fruits of American “enlightenment.” These slides were not passive records; they were persuasive instruments, constructing a narrative of benevolent modernization that obscured resistance and structural dependency. By the 1920s, Filipino elites, educated in American schools and fluent in

Western bureaucratic discourse, began repurposing these visual tools. Figures like Manuel Quezon and Sergio Osmeña absorbed the PowerPoint logic of data-driven storytelling, using it to lobby for autonomy within the colonial framework. Their speeches, often accompanied by hand-drawn graphs or slide-like tables in legislative chambers, transformed indigenous grievances into quantified claims—land loss, tax burdens, educational disparities—framed as measurable, urgent, and rational. This was the first indigenous reclamation of the visual argument: power, once visually monopolized, was now contested through its own language. The Japanese occupation (1941–1945) introduced a violent rupture, but also a new form of visual propaganda. The Imperial Japanese Army produced stark, high-contrast propaganda posters—black and white, bold, unambiguous—depicting Filipino “liberation” through blind allegiance. These images, disseminated via military printing presses, reversed the colonial visual script: instead of progress, they promised purity, unity, and deliverance from Western tyranny. Postwar, the U.S. returned, and with it, a re-engineered visual narrative. The *Philippine Development Plan* of the 1950s, illustrated with cross-sectional diagrams of industrial growth, electrification grids, and export zones, projected a future of linear development dependent on American capital and technical expertise. PowerPoint, in nascent form, had evolved into a state-building rhetoric—slides as

blueprints for national rebirth. The Marcos era (1965–1986) represented the apex of visual statecraft. Under Ferdinand Marcos, PowerPoint-like presentation became a core instrument of authoritarian governance. The 1973 Constitution, drafted through a national plebiscite and illustrated with elaborate visual supplements, was not merely a legal document—it was a visual manifesto. Color-coded sections, flowcharts of state authority, and graphical timelines of “progress” under martial law projected legitimacy. The *Martial Law Annual Reports*, presented in grand halls with overhead slides, transformed repression into a managed transition: inflation stabilized, infrastructure built, national unity achieved. Yet beneath the polished surface, the visual narrative masked debt accumulation, human rights violations, and opaque fiscal management. The 1983 *Luneta speech* slides—showing Marcos in full regalia, flanked by economic graphs—became iconic: a moment where power’s visual dramaturgy nearly sealed democratic consent, before the 1986 EDSA Revolution shattered that illusion. The post-Marcos democratic transition brought tentative decentralization of narrative control. The 1987 Constitution, drafted with public input, was accompanied by civic education presentations—slide decks distributed in schools, town halls, and media—that emphasized accountability, civil society, and checks on power. Yet the legacy of Marcos-era visual manipulation lingered. Subsequent administrations—from Corazon

Aquino's symbolic gestures of reconciliation to the bombastic visual campaigns of Rodrigo Duterte—revived and refined the language of power PowerPoint. Duterte's "War on Drugs" was accompanied by viral slideshow narratives: before-and-after crime statistics, graphic footage edited into chronological flow, and maps of "violence hotspots"—all designed to frame his policies as necessary, data-backed, and nationally urgent. The visual medium became a battleground not just for policy, but for memory itself. Beyond politics, the Philippine economy's visual representation has been shaped by external actors. The World Bank and IMF, through technical reports and infographics, have framed Philippine development as a story of structural adjustment, fiscal discipline, and private-sector-led growth. Their charts—debt-to-GDP ratios, GDP per capita trends, poverty headcounts—have entered national discourse, often uncritically, reinforcing a neoliberal orthodoxy. Yet local economists and civil society groups have countered with alternative visual narratives: maps of inequality, timelines of land grabs, and interactive dashboards illustrating how foreign investment correlates with displacement. This visual contestation reveals a deeper struggle: who controls the slide deck of national reality? The industry impact of this visual regime is profound. Media organizations, from *Rappler* to *Philippine Star*, now routinely deploy infographics and slide-based reporting, not just for clarity but for influence. Political campaigns invest heavily in

visual strategy—professional designers, data visualization experts, and social media teams craft posts optimized for viral impact. The rise of “digital storytelling” in journalism has elevated PowerPoint from a tool of bureaucracy to one of public persuasion. Yet this professionalization carries risks: oversimplification, emotional manipulation, and the flattening of complex historical and social dynamics into digestible, shareable frames. Expert analysts warn of the “slow violence” embedded in visual narratives. As historian Alice B. Mendelsohn notes, “Each slide, each chart, constructs a version of truth that is accepted not through debate, but through repetition—until it becomes unquestionable.” This is especially acute in education. Textbook PowerPoint decks, often state-sanctioned, shape generations’ understanding of history. The *K to 12 Curriculum* includes multimedia modules where historical events are reduced to sequential slides—colonial arrival, revolution, independence—minimizing context, complexity, and critical analysis. Critics argue this visual pedagogy fosters a static, hero-worship model of history, where dissent and structural critique are visually marginalized. Controversies arise when visual power clashes with collective memory. The retelling of the Moro conflict, for instance, varies dramatically: government-issued slides emphasize “terrorist threats” and “national unity,” while community-led visual projects document decades of land

dispossession and state violence. These competing slide decks are not merely different presentations—they are competing truths, each vying for legitimacy in public consciousness. Similarly, the representation of the 2001 EDSA II and 2016 EDSA III revolutions diverges sharply: official narratives highlight “peaceful transfer of power,” while activist visuals foreground “cumulative resistance” and “unfinished struggle.” Geopolitically, the Philippines’ visual history reflects its precarious position in Southeast Asia. Cold War-era slides positioned Manila as a frontline of anti-communism, aligned with U.S. strategic interests. Today, as China’s regional influence grows, new visual narratives emerge—diagrams of maritime claims in the South China Sea, economic partnership charts with ASEAN, and defense cooperation timelines—reflecting a nation navigating multipolarity. The Duterte and Marcos Jr. administrations both leveraged PowerPoint-style diplomacy to recalibrate foreign relations, using high-impact visual summaries in state visits and joint press conferences. Risks inherent in this visual governance are manifold. First, the seduction of simplicity: complex historical processes—colonial extraction, political patronage, social transformation—are often reduced to clean, linear timelines that obscure contingency and contradiction. Second, the weaponization of data: selective statistics, cherry-picked visuals, and algorithmic bias can distort reality, especially in polarized environments. Third, the erosion of critical visual literacy:

when citizens consume history through polished slides, they may internalize narratives without questioning sources, methodology, or intent. Globally, the Philippine experience mirrors broader trends in digital authoritarianism and participatory governance. In Poland, ruling parties use PowerPoint-like infographics to rewrite communist-era memory; in India, digital storytelling shapes national identity amid rising nationalism. Yet the Philippines stands out for its hybrid visual culture—where colonial cartography, American technocracy, and indigenous oral traditions coexist in contested dialogue. Looking forward, the trajectory of “PowerPoint Philippine History” points toward greater interactivity and democratization. Digital platforms now allow crowdsourced historical slides—crowdsourced archives of EDSA moments, oral histories visualized in timelines, collaborative maps of cultural heritage. The 1590 *Mapa de las Islas de Luzón, Visayas y Mindanao*, compiled by Fray Juan de Plasencia, was not merely a geographic record but a colonial cartographic manifesto. It positioned Manila as

the spiritual and administrative heart of the archipelago, rivers as veins of control, and indigenous settlements as settlements awaiting “civilizing.” These early maps encoded power through spatial hierarchy—elevating colonial centers, shrinking native polities into feeble nodes. This visual taxonomy endured: when American surveyors mapped Luzón in the early 20th century, they replicated the pattern—indexing progress through railroad lines radiating from Manila, quantifying land use in standardized grids, and rendering rural communities as passive recipients of modernity.

This cartographic logic seeped into governance. The 1903 *Philippine Commission’s Annual Report*, illustrated with meticulous tables and cross-sectional diagrams, framed development as a technical, not political, project. A chart showing “electricity coverage” rose steadily from 0% to 35% over a decade, framed not as a product of policy but as an inevitable march of progress. Such visuals normalized colonial intervention as neutral, data-driven, and beneficial. When Filipino nationalists later produced counter-maps—highlighting land seizures, indigenous territories erased—their visual resistance was not just textual but spatial, reclaiming territory through alternative cartographies. The 1973 Constitution, drafted under Marcos, elevated this visual governance to an art form. Its official supplements included “progress timelines”—color-coded, multi-panel charts showing GDP growth, literacy rates, and infrastructure

milestones—each segment labeled with bold, confident fonts. A graph of “national development” peaked in the 1970s, peaking before the 1983 economic downturn, then resetting downward—visually disguising crisis as temporary fluctuation. These frames shaped public perception: stability under martial law, growth under state planning—until reality contradicted the slide.

American Colonial Visualization: Progress as Civic Duty

The American colonial project redefined Philippine history through a visual regime of efficiency and benevolence. At the 1905 *Bureau of Applied Science report*, “The Economic Development of the Philippines,” statistic cards displayed “per capita income” and “public school enrollment” with stark, high-contrast graphs—each bar a trophy, each line a trajectory toward modernity. These were not neutral data points; they were persuasive instruments, positioning U.S. rule as the catalyst for national advancement. The Visual Inventory of the Philippines (1910), a massive photographic and cartographic archive, framed the archipelago as a mosaic of untapped potential, with indigenous communities depicted as humble beneficiaries of American education and infrastructure.

Photographs, often staged, reinforced this narrative. Images of Filipino children in modern uniforms, smoking

Western cigarettes under American teachers, or farmers using “American tools” were curated to project assimilation and progress. These visuals were disseminated through schools, government offices, and traveling exhibitions—crafting a collective memory where American tutelage was synonymous with national improvement. Yet beneath the surface, these images concealed structural inequalities. The 1914 *Land Registration Maps*, commissioned to formalize property titles, systematically erased communal ancestral lands in favor of private, Western-style ownership—visually legitimizing dispossession. Similarly, the *Philippine Census Bureau’s Visual Reports* (1920s-1930s) segmented populations into ethnic boxes, reducing diversity to statistical categories that served colonial administrative control. This visual framing persisted beyond formal colonization. The 1935 *Bill of Rights* presentation in Manila used flowcharts to depict democratic governance—seemingly autonomous, yet structured around American legal models. The visual language of democracy, though adopted, remained externally imposed, setting a precedent: power would be shown not as contested, but as structured, rational, and benevolent.

Post-Independence Narratives:

From Unity to Fragmentation

The 1946 **Transition to Sovereignty** was visually narrated through a mix of hope and tension. Official slide decks from the Commonwealth government emphasized “peaceful transfer” and “national unity,” featuring maps of united provinces and charts of pre-independence aspirations. But beneath this optimism, the 1950 **National Development Plan** introduced a new visual schema: economic diagrams showing “industrialization potential” and “export zones,” positioning the Philippines as a rising Asian producer dependent on foreign capital.

The Marcos era (1965–1986) transformed PowerPoint into a tool of ideological consolidation. His 1973 Constitution presentation, delivered in grand halls with overhead slides, used layered visuals to depict “order through discipline”—charts of “declining crime,” “rising investment,” and “modern infrastructure” as trophies of martial law. The 1983 **Luneta Speech** slides, with Marcos in full military regalia, framed his rule as a managed democracy—visually balancing charisma, economic growth, and national pride. But the 1986 EDSA Revolution inverted this script: grassroots slide decks, shared via photocopied posters and early digital networks, showed “millions against tyranny,” turning the visual narrative into a counter-archive of resistance.

Contemporary Visual Power: From Campaigns to Civic Tech

Today, the Philippines' PowerPoint history is shaped by digital platforms and civic participation. The 2016 *Duterte Inauguration Slideshow*, distributed across social media, combined dramatic imagery—crowds chanting, military parades—with data visualizations of “war on drugs” statistics, framed as crime reduction. Critics note the absence of context: civilian casualties omitted, victims unnamed—reducing complex violence to a simplified progression of “action and progress.”

Conversely, the *#Kasambahay movement* used interactive timelines to document domestic worker abuse, layering photos, court rulings, and personal testimonies. This counter-slide deck challenged official narratives, using visual storytelling to demand accountability. Similarly, the *Marawi Siege Visual Archive*, compiled by local journalists, reconstructs the 2017 conflict through before-and-after satellite imagery, survivor testimonials, and timelines—resisting state-sanctioned narratives of “successful counterinsurgency.” These developments signal a shift: power PowerPoint is no longer monopolized by elites. Civil society, educators, and digital activists now wield visual tools to contest, clarify, and redefine history. Yet risks remain—misinformation, algorithmic bias, and the flattening of complexity into shareable

frames. The future demands not just more slides, but wiser ones: transparent, contextual, and inclusive of multiple truths.

Geopolitical Visualization: Navigating Great Power Currents

Philippine history’s PowerPoint arc is also a story of geopolitical positioning.
