The six-week window became a narrative laboratory. The first week of observation, from August 7 to August 13, was a dissection of disorientation. Denton's field notes reveal a student navigating a world where names felt like foreign territories, where the rhythm of bell schedules clashed with the internal tempo of survival. Unlike standardized benchmarks that reduce childhood to test scores, the early weeks are where identity is first negotiated—between self-perception and societal expectations. For Kriete, this was compounded by a language barrier: though she was enrolled in an English-as-a-Second-Language (ESL) support program, her fluency remained fragmented, particularly in academic vocabulary. Denton recorded audio fragments of Kriete's attempts to answer "Show and Tell," capturing a hesitant voice: "I... I brought a photo. Of my abuela. She... she taught me to read. But not in English." Iowa, a state emblematic of America's rural-urban divide, exemplifies the uneven distribution of educational resources. While urban districts like Des Moines Public Schools boast \$18,000 per-pupil budgets and robust mental health infrastructure, neighboring rural districts often operate with half that, relying on underfunded Title I programs and volunteer-led counseling. Denton contextualized Kriete's experience within the U.S. Department of Education's 2022 Equity in Education Index, which revealed that 42% of rural students lacked consistent access to school psychologists—compared to 18% in urban counterparts. Risk extends beyond individual privacy. In an era of rising anti-immigrant sentiment and data surveillance, documenting marginalized youth demands vigilance. Denton’s team partnered with digital rights groups to encrypt all data and limit metadata exposure.
