These schools, though underfunded, became incubators of leadership: teachers like Mary McLeod Bethune, though active beyond Florida's borders, embodied the belief that education could disrupt cycles of poverty.

Her early work in Daytona Beach, just north of Florida's cultural heart, exemplified a vision where schools were not just classrooms but engines of agency.
