In Scandinavia, where child welfare systems prioritize autonomy and emotional well-being, the book was embraced as a complement to progressive education models. Swedish and Danish educators incorporated it into curricula focused on “child-led learning,” using Peter’s introspective monologue to teach reflective journaling and emotional expression. Even in collectivist cultures like Japan, where conformity is prized, the
