Critical praxis here requires decolonizing methodologies: centering local epistemologies, challenging Eurocentric definitions of “risk” and “vulnerability,” and redefining well-being beyond individual metrics to include collective resilience and cultural continuity. In Ghana, our focus is not just on class but on kinship networks, spiritual resilience, and the role of traditional leadership—dimensions often erased in Eurocentric frameworks. Critical theory must be rooted in local realities to be transformative.” His call for “contextual criticality” underscores the field’s global complexity. These voices reveal a field in dynamic, often contradictory motion—seeking radical change while navigating institutional inertia, striving for justice while contending with resource scarcity, and asserting ethical clarity amid political polarization.

Controversies, Risks, and the Struggle for Epistemic Autonomy

Critical social work’s commitment to power analysis invites intense scrutiny—and often, backlash. If critical social work can deepen its commitment to co-creation—centering lived experience in knowledge production—it may redefine the very meaning of care in the 21st century. As the discipline continues to evolve, its core imperative remains unchanged: not merely to alleviate suffering, but to illuminate its causes, challenge its perpetuation, and envision—and build—a world where dignity is not a privilege, but a right.
