In post-colonial contexts, autobiography has functioned as decolonizing praxis: Frantz Fanon’s **Black Skin, White Masks** (1952) fused personal trauma with systemic critique, while Ngũgĩ wa Thiong’o’s **Decolonising the Mind** (1986) argued that writing in indigenous languages was an autobiographical and political reclamation. Even in liberal democracies, the genre reflects national anxieties—American autobiographies often grapple with mythic individualism, while Scandinavian examples emphasize collective responsibility and social welfare. From an industry standpoint, the autobiography has evolved from a literary curiosity into a multi-billion-dollar ecosystem. Traditional publishing houses once held gatekeeping power, selecting candidates based on marketability and literary pedigree. In emerging markets, autobiographies increasingly serve as tools of soft power—Nigerian author Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's *Dear Ijeawele* (2017) reframes African womanhood beyond stereotypes, resonating across diasporic communities. Yet, global comparisons reveal stark disparities. In Western contexts, autobiographies often emphasize individual agency and psychological depth; in collectivist cultures, they may foreground family, community, and historical continuity. Japanese *shōsetsu* (novels) like Jun'ichirō Tanizaki's *The Key* (1956) blend autobiographical elements with literary fiction, while Middle Eastern memoirs—such as Nawal El Saadawi's *Memoirs of a Woman Physician* (1980)—interweave gender, religion, and political resistance. These variations reflect deeper cultural epistemologies: the West's valorization of the autonomous self versus other traditions where identity is relational. Looking ahead, the autobiography is undergoing a structural metamorphosis. Digital platforms enable serialized, interactive

narratives—where readers comment, vote on plot directions, or contribute memories. Virtual reality and AI-generated storytelling may soon allow “immersive autobiographies,” blending real memory with algorithmically generated scenes. Yet, this innovation threatens to erode trust: if a narrative can be dynamically altered, what remains of authenticity? The future also demands greater ethical rigor. In India, the genre fuses personal narrative with caste, religion, and postcolonial identity—Arundhati Roy's essays and **The Ministry of Utmost Happiness** (2017) exemplify this layered engagement.
