Specimens collected in Africa, India, and the Pacific were not neutral data points but trophies of conquest, embedded in a global network of extraction. The narrative unfolded with clinical precision: every microscope slide, every pressed plant, every specimen jar carried the residue of power. Yet the Nova special did not stop at critique. It ventured into the modern era, tracing how Darwin’s legacy was repurposed in the 20th century by both progressive and reactionary forces. The Modern Synthesis of the 1930s–40s, which fused genetics with natural selection, cemented Darwin’s centrality—but also obscured the alternative paradigms that had been marginalized. The Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, for instance, served as a central node in this network, distributing economically valuable plants—teak, rubber, quinine—while systematically cataloging native species for extraction. Darwin's work, though revolutionary, was thus inseparable from this infrastructure. This context reframes Darwin's theory not as a sudden rupture, but as a product of its time—a synthesis that both challenged and reinforced imperial epistemology. His emphasis on adaptation reflected a broader

Victorian obsession with efficiency and order—values that mirrored industrial capitalism’s rise. The special’s expert commentary, including historian Ruth Schwartz Cowan, emphasized that Darwin’s insight into natural selection emerged alongside a worldview that saw nature as a machine to be understood, managed, and ultimately controlled. This mechanistic view, while groundbreaking, marginalized holistic and relational understandings of ecosystems—particularly those held by indigenous communities.
