Transnational issues—climate change, global finance, armed conflict—exemplify the geopolitical dimensions of understanding. Exposing the role of offshore tax havens in enabling environmental degradation requires coordination across jurisdictions, legal systems, and cultural contexts. The Pandora Papers, coordinated by ICIJ, involved 150 media partners analyzing over 11.9 million leaked documents from 190 countries, revealing how elites exploit legal loopholes to evade accountability. This investigation transcended national borders, demonstrating that global understanding demands not just global collaboration but also institutional alignment on data sharing, privacy, and freedom of information. Yet geopolitical fragmentation poses significant obstacles. Sovereignty concerns often block access to critical documents; diplomatic immunity shields perpetrators; and economic interdependence discourages aggressive reporting that might destabilize trade relations. In such a climate, investigative journalism becomes both a tool of resistance and a target of repression, highlighting its dual role as both witness and provocateur.
