Dr. Sarah Khaleel, a historian specializing in post-conflict memory at the University of Cambridge, describes the phenomenon as a “new category of epistemic subjectivity”: “These individuals are not merely survivors. They are living archives whose testimony bridges the gap between personal trauma and collective history. Their loss is not personal—it is epistemological. Without them, entire narratives evaporate.” Journalist and OSINT expert Omar Khawam, who has worked with the Syrian Archive, emphasizes the technical and ethical challenges: “We’re not just collecting stories. We’re assembling evidence that may be prosecuted in courts decades later. The pressure to authenticate while preserving authenticity is unprecedented. And the risk—of silencing the only witness—is real.” In Latin America, where decades of state violence left sparse survivors, human rights advocate María Fernández notes: “In countries like Guatemala and Chile, ‘the only one left’ often carries the weight of generations. Their survival is not just personal; it’s a claim to truth. But that claim is constantly under siege—by denial, by political indifference, by the slow erosion of memory.” Legal scholar Dr. Elias Molefe, focused on transitional justice, warns: “When the last witness dies, the legal
