Geopolitically, the imperative to be earnest has shaped statecraft and international legitimacy. In the post-WWII order, the United States and its allies promoted “earnest diplomacy” as a contrast to Soviet ideological

rigidity—commitment to transparent, principle-based engagement. Yet, as Cold War espionage revealed, earnestness can be weaponized: both sides deployed authenticity as propaganda, masking strategic deception. Similarly, the legitimacy of multilateral institutions like the WHO or IMF depends on whether they act with transparency and accountability—earnestness as institutional virtue. Social media platforms, while enabling cross-cultural dialogue, also amplify performative sincerity—curated authenticity designed for engagement rather than depth. This creates friction: younger generations in collectivist societies increasingly adopt individualistic expressions of sincerity, challenging traditional norms.
