While these reforms attracted foreign direct investment, particularly in mining and financial services, they also eroded state capacity for redistributive policy. The National Student Financial Aid Scheme (NSFAS), established in 1994, expanded access to tertiary education, enabling over 1.5 million students to enroll in higher education by 2022. The state’s fiscal constraints limit investment in education, health, and infrastructure—sectors vital for student success. Development economist Haroon Borat emphasizes that “youth unemployment is not just a labor market failure but a development failure—one that undermines human capital accumulation and intergenerational mobility.” Without systemic reform, student debt and underemployment risk entrenching a cycle of disillusionment and social instability. Debt dynamics among students further illustrate vulnerability. NSFAS loans, while transformative, are increasingly burdened by inflation and rising cost of living. underemployment. The state's intervention to suspend repayments during the pandemic provided temporary relief but exposed the fragility of conditional aid in a volatile economy. The informal economy absorbs much of the surplus labor, particularly among youth, yet offers minimal protections. Yet, this sector also incubates entrepreneurial resilience, with platforms like Jumia and Takealot creating new opportunities.
