By the early 1500s, this system had fueled the Crown’s fiscal engine: silver from Potosí and Zacatecas financed wars in Europe, while sugar plantations in the Caribbean and later tobacco in Virginia signaled a nascent Atlantic economy. Yet this prosperity was built on systemic violence. The Taíno population of Hispaniola plummeted from an estimated half-million to fewer than 2,000 within decades. Las Casas's account provided a moral and legal framework to defend indigenous rights while legitimizing Spanish rule—on new, more humane terms. The economic implications of Las Casas's critique were profound and complex. If the **encomienda** system was morally indefensible, then Spain's economic model required recalibration. His proposals influenced the New Laws of 1542, which sought to abolish hereditary *encomiendas* and protect indigenous communities—though these were fiercely resisted by colonists, triggering revolts like the 1546 rebellion in Peru. The tension between moral principle and economic pragmatism defined Las Casas's legacy: he was both a critic and a colonial participant, a reformer within empire who exposed its darkest contradictions. From a scholarly perspective, **Historia de las Indias** represents a pioneering fusion of empirical observation and moral philosophy. Las Casas compiled extensive documentation—letters, royal decrees, missionary reports, and personal accounts—creating one of the first systematic histories of the Americas. His methodology prefigured modern historical criticism: he cross-referenced sources, questioned biases, and emphasized eyewitness credibility. Yet his work was not without limitations. His view of indigenous societies retained some hierarchical assumptions, and his reliance on theological frameworks sometimes obscured secular power

dynamics. Nonetheless, his insistence on accountability—on holding rulers and clerics responsible for human suffering—set a precedent for later human rights advocacy. Historians like Felipe Fernández-Armesto describe him as “the first modern conscience of the Americas,” whose critique of colonialism prefigured 19th-century anti-imperial movements and 20th-century decolonization. Legal scholar Carlos Malamud notes that Las Casas’s arguments laid groundwork for international law, particularly in defining crimes against humanity and the rights of indigenous peoples—a lineage visible in the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (2007). His voice, amplified through print and ecclesiastical channels, helped shift European discourse from conquest as divine right to conquest as moral obligation. Yet Las Casas’s project was fraught with risks and contradictions. As a reformer, he faced threats from colonists who labeled him a traitor, and ecclesiastical scrutiny over his shifting loyalties—first to strict Franciscan asceticism, later to Dominican activism. His defense of indigenous rights often clashed with colonial interests: despite Crown decrees, *encomenderos* resisted enforcement, and many native populations continued to suffer under new forms of exploitation. Las Casas himself admitted failure: the **encomienda** did not vanish, but his voice had altered the terms of debate. In doing so, he exposed the fragility of imperial legitimacy rooted in moral compromise. Comparatively, Las Casas’s moral stance stands apart from contemporaneous European justifications of colonization. While figures like Thomas More balanced critique with pragmatic acceptance, Las Casas refused concession. Economically, Las Casas's challenge to coercive labor systems presages modern critiques of exploitative global supply chains. His vision of voluntary exchange and human dignity finds echoes in fair trade movements and labor rights advocacy. The tension he navigated—between economic development and ethical responsibility—remains unresolved in the 21st century, particularly in resource-rich but historically marginalized regions. From a geopolitical standpoint, Las Casas's **Historia** illustrates how moral discourse can shape imperial policy. The Crown's partial reforms, though limited, reflect the power of narrative and conscience in curbing excess. Today, similar dynamics play out in international institutions: human rights advocacy, legal accountability mechanisms, and transnational civil society all channel the spirit of Las Casas's reform. Scholarly projections emphasize Las Casas as a critical node in the genealogy of global human rights. His work bridges medieval natural law and modern human rights frameworks, demonstrating how ethical reasoning evolves through crisis. As postcolonial theory continues to re-examine colonial narratives, Las

Casas emerges not as a flawless hero, but as a complex, courageous figure whose insights remain urgently relevant. In the end, **Historia de las Indias** is more than a historical document—it is a moral intervention that challenged an empire to confront its conscience. Las Casas did not dismantle colonialism, but he redefined its terms. His legacy endures in every demand for justice, every call for truth-telling, and every effort to build a world where human dignity is not sacrificed at the altar of power
