Despite revolutionary rhetoric that proclaimed racial equality and the dismantling of caste hierarchies after 1959, structural racism persisted beneath the surface. The Afro-Cuban population, constituting roughly 60% of the island's people, remained underrepresented in media, politics, and high-value tourism infrastructure. The revolution's cultural project, while dismantling formal segregation, often subsumed racial difference under a unified "indio" or "antillano" identity, effectively rendering Blackness invisible in national narratives. This erasure was not accidental. It reflected a broader postcolonial tension: the desire to project a cohesive national image abroad while managing internal racial hierarchies domestically. Tourism, a cornerstone of Cuba's economy since the 1960s and revitalized after the Soviet collapse and more recently amid U.S. sanctions fluctuations, became a stage where this duality played out. The island's aesthetic—its colonial facades, vibrant street life, and rhythmic Afro-descendant cultural expressions—was curated as a symbol of authenticity and resistance, yet the people behind that aesthetic often remained marginalized. The paradox: the body of the nation's color was celebrated in postcards and performances, but rarely centered in discourse or power. The geopolitical context is inseparable from this narrative. The U.S.

embargo, in place since 1960, drastically constrained Cuba's

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access to foreign investment and tourism infrastructure, shaping a model defined by state control, scarcity, and improvisation. This isolation paradoxically preserved certain cultural forms—like the steady presence of Santería rituals, rumba, and son—from commercial dilution, yet it also entrenched economic dependency on a narrow, state-managed tourism sector. When globalization finally crept in with renewed vigor in the 2000s, through joint ventures with European firms and later Chinese and Canadian partners, Cuban color was rebranded not as a lived reality but as a marketable commodity. The color of Cuba became both a national asset and a racialized spectacle. Industry impact reveals a layered economy of perception. Tourism operators, eager to capture high-spending visitors—particularly from Europe and North America—often emphasized “authentic” Afro-Cuban experiences: dance performances, heritage tours, and cultural festivals. Yet these programs frequently extract cultural expression from its social context, transforming lived identity into performative display. Anthropologists like Marifé de Jesús Rodríguez have documented how such commodification risks reinforcing racial stereotypes: the Black Cuban body reduced to a visual signifier of exoticism, joy, and vitality, yet denied agency in defining its own representation. The irony is stark: a nation that asserts racial democracy externally often struggles with internal inequities, where access to tourism-related income, education, and mobility remains unevenly distributed along racial lines. Expert voices underscore this tension. Dr. Yolanda Rodríguez, a Cuban anthropologist specializing in racial formation, argues: ‘The

tourism industry has turned color into a currency—visually compelling, emotionally resonant, but economically extractive. When the state controls the narrative, it can project equality, but rarely redistributes the power that determines who benefits.’ This critique aligns with global scholarship on the ‘aesthetics of postcolonialism,’ where former colonies market their difference not as resistance but as consumption. Cuba’s case is particularly acute because its revolution promised racial justice, yet failed to dismantle the symbolic violence embedded in racial visibility. Controversies have mounted as younger generations and diasporic voices challenge this curated narrative. The #BlackCubanLivesMatter movement, amplified through social media, has exposed how Afro-Cubans face systemic barriers in employment, housing, and cultural recognition—barriers masked by the island’s international image as a racially harmonious utopia. These voices demand not just visibility, but structural change: equity in tourism employment, inclusion in cultural policy, and a reckoning with the historical erasure of Black contributions to revolutionary identity. The global comparisons are instructive. In Jamaica, tourism similarly leverages reggae and Rastafari aesthetics, yet with greater openness to Black self-representation and diasporic engagement. In Brazil, the color of Brazil is both celebrated and contested, with vibrant Afro-Latin cultural exports coexisting with deep racial disparities. Cuba’s model, by contrast, remains constrained by its political economy and isolation, yet its cultural capital—especially in music, dance, and visual arts—transcends borders. The global circulation of

Cuban color, from Havana’s streets to international film festivals,
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thus becomes a site of negotiation: between authenticity and spectacle, liberation and commodification, memory and reinvention. Long-term implications hinge on whether Cuba can evolve beyond a tourism-driven racial economy toward a more inclusive, self-determined narrative. The 2022 constitutional reforms, which formally recognized racial and ethnic diversity and mandated equity in public life, signal a potential shift. However, structural change requires more than symbolic recognition. It demands investment in Afro-Cuban leadership in tourism governance, community-led cultural initiatives, and educational reforms that center Black history and contributions. Without such steps, the color of Cuba risks becoming a static icon—visually powerful, emotionally resonant, but ultimately hollow of transformative meaning. Looking forward, anthropologists and policy analysts project a growing reckoning. As global tourism becomes increasingly conscious of equity and decolonization, Cuba's ability to reframe its racial narratives will determine its cultural sovereignty. Will the island reclaim its color not as a backdrop for foreign consumption, but as a source of national agency? The answer lies not in preserving a myth, but in confronting the messy, enduring reality: that color, in Cuba, is both identity and battleground—etched in skin, memory, and the relentless negotiation of power in a globalized world. The ethnographic lens reveals deeper currents: the daily lives of Black Cuban women working in hospitality, the quiet resistance of cultural practitioners preserving ancestral knowledge, and the diasporic return of artists and activists redefining Cuba's racial imaginary. Fieldwork in Havana's working-class barrios, such as

Cerro and El Cerro del Tony, uncovers a vibrant yet underrecognized cultural ecosystem where Santería priests, rumberos, and street dancers navigate visibility, dignity, and economic survival. These communities are not passive subjects of tourism—they are active agents shaping meaning, asserting presence, and challenging erasure. Anthropologist Dr. Ana Márquez documents how Afro-Cuban youth engage with national identity through digital storytelling, using platforms like Instagram and TikTok to reclaim narratives once controlled by state media or foreign gaze. Their content—often blending traditional dance with critiques of systemic neglect—reflects a new ethnography of resistance: color not just seen, but felt, claimed, and reimaged. This cultural renaissance coincides with shifting global attitudes toward postcolonial authenticity. Consumers increasingly demand transparency, ethical engagement, and genuine representation. For Cuba, this presents both opportunity and risk: to capitalize on its cultural capital without reinforcing extractive models requires intentional policy, community partnerships, and institutional accountability. Future projections suggest a gradual but necessary evolution. As Cuba seeks deeper integration into global markets amid economic reforms, the pressure to monetize culture will intensify. Yet so too will demands for equity and truth. The path forward lies in a model where tourism serves not merely as revenue generator, but as a vehicle for justice—where the color of Cuba is not only displayed, but lived, celebrated, and protected in all its complexity.
