The pivotal shift toward comparative analysis emerged not from grassroots reformers, but from transnational policy networks. The OECD's PISA, designed to evaluate 15-year-olds' proficiency in reading, mathematics, and science, introduced a common metric across 80+ countries. This created an implicit benchmarking logic: if nations could compare their students' performance, so too could policymakers assess the efficacy of curricula. Finland's emphasis on minimal testing and holistic development contrasted sharply with high-stakes assessment regimes, sparking global debate on

the purpose of schooling. China's rapid ascent in international rankings, particularly in STEM, underscored the stakes. Its rigorous, exam-driven system—epitomized by the gaokao—became a model of efficiency, but also a subject of scrutiny regarding student well-being. The Chinese government's response, including curriculum revisions to incorporate creativity and critical thinking, mirrors a global recalibration: recognizing that high performance must coexist with holistic development. These dynamics reveal a fundamental tension: curriculum comparison worksheets serve both as tools for improvement and instruments of conformity. These controversies underscore a fundamental challenge: how can comparison serve genuine improvement without enforcing homogenization?
