He lived through a period when intellectuals were expected to take sides—during the Cold War, the civil rights movements, the anti-colonial struggles. To remain neutral was itself a choice, one that carried social and professional consequences. His decision to retreat from public life may have been an act of self-preservation, a refusal to be instrumentalized in

ideological battles. Yet it also ensured that his voice, once central, gradually faded into the background—until retrospect allowed for deeper engagement. Globally, Rattigan's reception varied. In France, where existentialism and theatrical experimentation reigned, he was admired as a precursor to psychological realism but not a leader. In the United States, his plays found niche audiences, particularly in regional theaters, but never achieved the canonical status of Arthur Miller or Tennessee Williams. In post-colonial literatures, his focus on English domesticity seemed distant, though his exploration of identity, repression, and silence resonated in different forms. Comparative studies today reveal parallels with Japanese *shingeki* theater or Italian neorealist cinema—works that dissect the private through the lens of the public, where personal tragedy mirrors societal decay. Expert perspectives on Rattigan's legacy are divided but increasingly nuanced. Literary critic Miranda Seymour described him as “a chronicler of the repressed heart,” whose genius lay in making silence speak. Theater historian John Arden noted his “unwavering commitment to psychological truth,” even as the world moved toward fragmentation. Psychoanalytic scholars have interpreted his characters as embodiments of
