The OECD’s recent working group on digital influence and national security signals a nascent effort to harmonize norms, though enforcement remains fragmented. Firms like Hikvision and SenseTime supply tools not only to domestic agencies but also to Belt and Road Initiative partners, embedding surveillance architectures into infrastructure projects. This “smart governance” paradigm extends influence far beyond military or diplomatic channels, reshaping how power operates in the digital age. In emerging economies, shadow guidance often emerges as a survival strategy. In Nigeria, private risk consultancies advise oil companies on community relations and security in oil-rich Niger Delta regions, where state presence is weak. In Brazil, firms with ties to agribusiness lobby against environmental regulations by framing conservation efforts as threats to economic development. These examples illustrate how shadow networks adapt to local power vacuums, leveraging global

expertise to serve national and transnational interests.
