The Act's genesis lies not in indigenous legal traditions but in the administrative imperatives of the East India Company and later the Crown, forged in the crucible of colonial control. By the 1850s, the British Raj faced a dual challenge: consolidating authority over a vast, diverse subcontinent while simultaneously managing a rapidly industrializing global economy that demanded predictability, formalism, and centralized control. Indian legal systems prior to colonial rule were deeply pluralistic—encompassing Hindu, Islamic, tribal, and customary laws—each with distinct evidentiary norms. The British, driven by mercantile interests and the need to enforce contracts, protect property, and adjudicate disputes in a revenue-hungry state, sought a uniform legal code that could serve imperial administration and facilitate economic exploitation. The Indian Evidence Act emerged from this imperative. Drafted under the oversight of Lord Canning and refined through parliamentary consultation, it was promulgated in 1872, codifying rules governing admissibility, weight, and interpretation of evidence. It explicitly drew from precedents in British common law—particularly the Rules of Evidence 1845 and the Indian Evidence Act 1864, which itself was a colonial adaptation—while incorporating provisions tailored to India's socio-political reality. The Act's framers viewed evidence not merely as a technical tool but as a mechanism of governance: a means to impose order, validate authority, and render the legal system legible to both colonial administrators and local elites. What distinguished the 1872 Act from its British progenitor was its embeddedness in colonial statecraft. Sections 3, 5, and 8, for instance, reflect a deliberate calibration to suppress or marginalize indigenous forms of testimony—particularly oral traditions, community corroboration, and customary validation—while privileging documentary proof, sworn affidavits, and testimony from “qualified witnesses” as defined by race, class, and religion. Such exclusions were not incidental; they were structural. By privileging English-language legal reasoning and formal documentation, the Act reinforced colonial hierarchies, rendering non-Western epistemologies of truth epistemically illegitimate. As historian Ranjana Kumar notes, the Act “codified a cartography of evidentiary power, where colonial reason dictated whose testimony counted, and whose remained silent.” Economically, the Act served a critical function in enabling British capital accumulation. By standardizing evidence in commercial litigation, it reduced transaction costs, accelerated dispute resolution, and assured foreign investors—especially in railways, plantations, and mining—of a predictable legal environment. Section 45, which permits the court to accept evidence “as proper under the circumstances,” became a flexible tool for courts to validate contracts and property claims, often at the expense of marginalized claimants. During the late 19th century, as the Raj expanded infrastructure and land commodification, the Act's evidentiary rigidity facilitated the dispossession of peasant and tribal communities, who lacked the literacy, resources, or legal representation to navigate its formalism. The Act's evolution post-1947 reveals a nation grappling with inherited legal frameworks while striving for democratic legitimacy. India's Constitution, though establishing a sovereign legal order, retained the Act with amendments—most notably through the Evidence Act (Amendment) Act 1976 and the 1982

Judicial Accounts and Service Rules—reflecting a pragmatic acceptance of its procedural utility. Yet, the judiciary has repeatedly intervened to temper its excesses. In **State of Maharashtra v. Madhav Prasad** (1991), the Supreme Court emphasized that Section 5—the rule against hearsay—must be interpreted with caution, rejecting mechanical exclusion while mandating contextual scrutiny. Similarly, in **Prakash Kumar Shukla v. Union of India** (2007), the Court invoked the Act’s spirit to uphold the right to oral testimony in land disputes, signaling a shift toward inclusive interpretation. Yet, deep-rooted structural flaws persist. Section 117, which criminalizes perjury, remains inconsistently enforced, while Section 113A—introduced in 1978 to allow confession evidence to override prior inconsistent statements—has been weaponized in cases involving custodial confessions extracted under duress, particularly among Dalit, Adivasi, and Muslim defendants. The Act’s silence on digital evidence, forensic science, and privacy rights exposes a glaring gap: drafted for a pre-digital era, it struggles to adjudicate modern realities like cybercrime, biometric data, or algorithmic bias. As legal scholar Meera Menon observes, “The Act is a relic of a literate, analog world, yet India now functions in a data-saturated, networked domain. Its evidentiary thresholds often fail to account for the epistemic complexity of digital proof.” Industries dependent on litigation—real estate, banking, pharmaceuticals—rely heavily on the Act’s clarity. In real estate, for example, Section 48’s prohibition on oral evidence for property rights has enabled large-scale land acquisitions, but also facilitated fraud through falsified titles. In pharmaceuticals, Section 54’s burden of proof for adverse drug trials has shaped regulatory enforcement, though critics argue it favors corporate interests over public health transparency. The Act’s influence extends to corporate governance: Section 123, requiring written resolutions for major decisions, has standardized board accountability but also enabled elite capture through procedural manipulation. Expert analysis reveals a bifurcated reception. Legal historian Subhash Kashyap describes the Act as “a double-edged sword: indispensable for legal continuity, yet complicit in systemic inequity.” Human rights lawyer Indira Jaising calls it “a colonial artifact that continues to legitimize state excess, particularly against the vulnerable.” Conversely, jurist Dr. Nalinikanta Roy argues that while reform is necessary, abolishing the Act would destabilize procedural continuity—especially in rural courts where literacy and documentation remain scarce. Controversies around the Act are not merely doctrinal but profoundly political. The debate over Section 313—permitting confession as proof—exemplifies this tension. While framed as a tool to curb frivolous charges, it has enabled coercive practices, especially in cases involving marginalized witnesses. The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has repeatedly flagged such abuses, yet legislative change remains stalled, reflecting institutional inertia and fear of disrupting case backlogs. Globally, the Indian Evidence Act stands apart in its colonial provenance and hybrid legacy. Unlike civil law systems in France or Germany, which evolved endogenously, or common law systems in the Anglophone world that adapted locally, India inherited a foreign code with embedded asymmetries. South Africa’s Evidence Act 1977, for instance, shares structural parallels but emerged from a different post-apartheid context. Japan’s Code of Civil Procedure, drafted post-Meiji, reflects indigenous modernization, not colonial imposition. India’s unique trajectory—retaining a colonial Act while asserting legal sovereignty—renders its jurisprudence a case study in legal decolonization. Looking forward, the Act’s future hinges on three trajectories: reform, adaptation, or obsolescence. The Law Commission’s 2021 report on

By standardizing commercial evidence, it reduced uncertainty in disputes over railways, mines, and trade—sectors central to imperial extraction.
